## A GAME OF MISTAKES

You deal and pass.Your partner openes 1 NT in $3^{\text {rd }}$ position. RHO passes and it's back to you.

## S South <br> - 1054 <br> K109853 <br> K1064

You count 6 HCP, but in a heart contract you get 2 extra points for the 6 -card trump suit as well as 5 more points for the diamond void. You have enough to force to game in hearts - even if partner has only 2 hearts. You should use the Texas Transfer bid of $4 *$. This is a bid that says you don't want to go beyond game and you promise 6 or more hearts. Partner accepts the transfer and rebids $4 \bullet$ - the final contract.

East leads the $\$$. Take over for North and plan the play:
S South

- 1054

K109853
K1064
East leads 42


You have two spade losers and the $\vee$ A to lose. You can't afford to lose a club to a ruff by East. Surely, his $\$ 2$ was a singleton. You win in your hand and play trump immediately, hoping the $\uparrow$ A is in East, so he can't lead to his own cub shortage.

As luck would have it, East comes up with the M on the first heart lead and returns a small diamond. West puts up the $\downarrow K$ and you win the $\downarrow A$, discarding a spade from the dummy. You pull a second trump with your remining $\downarrow$ J and get the bad news that trumps split 4-1. Go back to the dummy by leading the $\star$ J. East covers with the $\downarrow$ and you ruff in the dummy. Pull the last 2 trump and run the remaining diamonds and clubs to take 12 tricks in all.

East should have switched to spades rather than to diamonds after he won the $\downarrow$ A. Then they take two spade tricks holding you to $4 \boldsymbol{}$. But mistakes are part the game and it sometimes is the opponent's mistake that keeps us coming back for more!
