## BIDDING IT ON YOUR OWN

East passes and what do you open?


To your 18 HCP you can add 3 length points for 6 and 5 card suits. You get another 2 points for the two quality suits ( $4+$ card suits with 3 honors.) You could open 2 but your two suits are minors and using the 2 strong artificial opening often leads to awkward auctions. The biggest problem is that partner is liable to respond $2 \downarrow$, your best suit. You want to be the declarer with this hand. I like to open these hands 1 and then jump to show my strength after partner responds.

West doubles for takeout, partner passes and East jumps to $2 \boldsymbol{\text { . You can }}$ now show your second suit, rebidding $3 \$$. West raises his major suit to 3 which is passed around to you. What do you do now?

Yes, you are vulnerable and they stopped in part score. This argues for your giving up to the opponents. However, your void in their suit, your good second club suit and your super-duper diamond suit might convince you to take one more bid. I would. Your 4 bid is passed around to East, who doubles for penalty.

West leads the $A$ and you see this dummy.

This dummy is bad, but it could be worse. At least North holds 3 diamonds.
What are your prospects for taking 10 tricks?
You have 6 diamonds and the A for seven tricks off the top. Perhaps the heart finesse will work, but for the other two tricks you must either ruff two clubs in the dummy or set up the $5^{\text {th }}$ club in your hand.

You will ruff the A lead but you cannot afford to pull trump until you have set up the clubs for a ruff. Play the A and another club, won by East. He should return a small trump, but in actuality he led another spade, trying to tap you out of diamonds.

You are happy and win in your hand. You can now lead a club up to the dummy. Make sure you ruff with the $\$ 9$, not the $\$ 3$. It is only the $\$ 10$ that is outstanding and can beat your other diamonds. East started with 2 clubs as well, and over-ruffs with the 10 . Now he leads a trump and you win in your hand and successfully ruff the club with dummy's $\$ 8$. Now lead a heart to your hand and hold your breath. The $\mathbf{~ K}$ holds and all the opponent's clubs are used up. You can pull the last trump and take the good club, making your 4* doubled contract.

This is the entire deal:


Notice that if West had led a diamond initially and kept leading diamonds each time they got in the lead, they could have held you to 9 tricks.
