

FIND THE MISSING JACK

You are sitting in South and have this hand:



- (1) Whether you are playing 2 over 1 Game Force or Standard American, your response to your partner's opening bid of 1 → is 2 ♣. You haven't yet found a suit but you want to let partner know you have a good hand. In Standard American it promises 10 or more points and in 2 over 1, it is forcing to game. Either way it is forcing for one round.
- (2)Your partner must have a sensational hand. He knows he has controls in all the suits and now just wants to know about your *key cards*.
- (3) In the type of Blackwood you are playing, there are five *key cards*: the four aces and the king of trump. 5♥ would say you have 2 key cards **without** the queen of trump; 5♠ says you have two key cards **with** the queen of trump.
- (4) Your partner now knows you have sufficient controls and enough key cards to make a slam.

West leads the ♠J and you see this beautiful dummy:




What's your plan?

You couldn't have asked for more from your partner. You have 1 spade loser that you can't do anything about. Your two heart losers are slow losers. You can discard them on the long diamonds in the dummy. You have no diamond losers. But you cannot afford to lose a club to the \$\int_1\$. If the

outstanding clubs break 2-2 or 3-1 you have no problem. If they break 4-0 you will have to finesse against the opponent with the clubs, whomever it turns out to be. Your key holding of the ♣109. There is only one significant club outstanding. Therefore, the correct play is to win the spade continuation and lead a low club to the ♣K. If both defenders follow suit you only need to pull the remaining trump and run the diamonds, discarding the ♥106. If one shows out you still have a two way finesse and you can easily pick up the ♣J.

However, what if you were missing the \$10. Now the correct play is to take the \$A first, planning to finesse the \$9, if the clubs break 4-0 and it is East that holds the clubs. If West holds the four clubs, there is nothing you can do. You are going to be set. Of course, if both opponents play to the first club, you just pull them from the top, as before.
