## THE RIGHT WAY TO FINESSE

After a brief auction you end in 3NT and your LHO leads the V6. You see this pretty dummy:

What would be your plan? Specifically, how would you play the first trick?

Of course, the first thing you do is count the top tricks. You have 4 diamonds, 4 clubs and the ace of hearts. You can get an extra trick by finessing the VQ against the king. If West led away from the king your $Q$ will be the $10^{\text {th }}$ trick.

The next thing you must think about is what could go wrong. You are defenseless in spades. If East holds the $V K$ and switches to spades, you will lose at least 4 spades (there are 8 outstanding) and that, with the $\because K$, is enough to set you. You are risking cold 9 tricks against actually going down. The right play is to rise with the VA and take your eight tricks in the minor suits. Look at East's hand and tell me he wouldn't switch to the $\uparrow$ !
