## USING THE WESTERN CUEBID

You are sitting in the South with this hand:

S	South
٠	AK4

•	AK854

As dealer, you have a choice of opening bids. You have 14 HCP and a nice 5-card club suit that adds another point. Using a range of 15-17 points you could open 1NT. But since your red suits are so weak, you might opt for a 1 + bid.

Say you do open 1♠ and you hear your partner respond 1♦. You intend to rebid 1NT, but before you can, your LHO overcalls 2♥. You dearly wish to play this in 2NT or 3NT but you are worried about hearts. There is a way to find out if partner has a heart stopper. It is the cuebid of 3♥. This cuebid has a special meaning and a special name: the western cuebid. If asks partner if he has a stopper in the opponent's suit and if he does, it asks him to bid 3NT. If he doesn't have the stopper, he bids something else – whatever is appropriate for his holdings.

Here is how the bidding progresses:

Your partner is playing the contract in 3NT and he naturally gets a **V**Q lead:

Taking the North position, you count your top tricks. You have 2 spades, 1 diamond and 5 clubs. You only have 1 heart stopper but that is enough for the 9<sup>th</sup> trick. You take your winners and run.
