

## WHAT AN OVERCALL CAN DO

Partner deals and passes, but your RHO opens 1♣. What would you do with this hand?

S	South
♠	A109
♥	J8
♦	KJ973
♣	J53

At one of the tables playing this hand, South passed. West responded 1♥ and East raised hearts. They reached 4♥ and easily make the contract.

At another table, South overcalled 1♦. West bid 1♥ as he did in the other table, but now North raised his partner to 4♦. East passed this bid, which went around to West, who bid 5♣. This was the bidding:

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Notice that North had only 6 HCP, but with his 6 diamonds, he knew that his partner would be playing in an 11-card fit, as a minimum. This type of a competitive jump raise

puts the opponents to a guess. As you'll see, they guessed wrong in this case. The favorable vulnerability gives you a three trick set allowance before the penalty exceeds the game value in heart by East/West. (4♦ goes down 3 tricks since the spade finesse is working.)

South led a low diamond which was won in the dummy. The declarer easily pulled all the trump and took his 5 hearts, but he was left with 3 spades in each hand which he had to lose to the defenders two top spades, North capturing declarer's ♠Q. The result was down 1. These are the same three tricks lost by the 4♥ bidders, but the scores, here, were 520 points better.

There are several reasons to overcall with a long suit, even with a weak hand. One, is to get a lead if your partner gets that opportunity. A second reason is shown in this example, where partner can use knowledge of your 5-card suit to either sacrifice or push the opponents too high.
