## ♠♥♦♠ COUNTING FROM THE LEAD ♠♥♦♠

East deals and passes. This is your hand:



You have 16 very balanced points and open 1NT. Your partner raises you to 3NT. West leads the •4 and you see this dummy:



West's Lead: ♠4




Counting your winners, you have 1 Spade, 2 Hearts, 1 Diamond and 2 Clubs. You need 3 more tricks. You have two finesses available: the  $\bigcirc$  Q and the  $\bigcirc$  Q (depending if you don't see the  $\bigcirc$  A on this first trick). But there is no doubt about the Clubs. You must find the  $\bigcirc$  Q!

Play low on the Spade lead and hope East puts up the  $\clubsuit$ A. Unfortunaely, he plays the  $\clubsuit$ 9, and you win your  $\clubsuit$ K. Then, start the Club suit by leading the  $\clubsuit$ A. You don't want to lose the finesse to a singleton  $\clubsuit$ Q in East. Since both defenders play low to the  $\clubsuit$ A, lead the  $\clubsuit$ 2 up to the  $\clubsuit$ J. This holds. Now you can later, lead up to the dummy for the marked finesse against West's  $\clubsuit$ Q.

But while in the dummy, lead a low Diamond to your ♠ Q, in hand. Unfortunately, this loses to West's ♠ K. West leads the ♠ J and you might as well cover it with the ♠ Q. East wins his ♠ A. You have lost both finesses in the "pointed" suits. Your only hope is for something good to happen in Hearts.

You come to hand in Hearts and lead a Club up to dummy; then play the last Club to fell the  $\P$ Q. All this time, East has been discarding Hearts. When you lead your second low Heart, East plays his last Heart, the  $\P$ J, and West must play the  $\P$ Q under your  $\P$ A. Now your  $\P$ 10 is good for the  $\P$ 1trick. Miracles sometimes do happen.
