
AVA COUNTING HELPS AVA

West deals and opens the bidding with $1 \spadesuit$. Your partner overcalls $1 \clubsuit$ and East passes. What do you do with this hand?



You have Diamonds well stopped. Partner has your Hearts stopped (hopefully) and you have stoppers in the two other suits. Plus, you have 15 HCP's. There is nothing to do but bid notrump. Some would advance with 2NT. I would assume partner has about 9 or 10 points and just jump to 3NT.

By the way, if you advance with $2 \spadesuit$, partner will read that as support for her Hearts and 10 or more points. $2 \spadesuit$ is not natural in this context.

The auction ends at 3NT and West led the ♦ 2. You see this dummy:



Lead: ♦2




As long as Diamonds spit no worse than 4-1, you have 6 Diamond tricks, and the 2 Aces in the black suits. You need one more.

Whenever your opponents have made bids, it's usually helpful to count out the hand, using the auction as a guide to where the points lie. You and the dummy have a total of 26 HCP. West opened, so you can assign him 12 HCP. That only leaves 2 points for East. Where are the missing Kings? West must have them. Rather than take losing finesses, you can easily end play West and force him to lead away from one or more of the Kings.

The first thing you must do it determine if you are facing a 5-0 Diamond split. You need to play the ◆9 to the first trick. If East follows, you know that West must have no more than four Diamonds and your 6 Diamond tricks will run.

East does follow with the $\blacklozenge 4$ so you take your 6 Diamonds. Now, all you have to do is arrange for West to take the lead. He must give you a trick with whatever he leads. The simplest way to do this is to run the $\blacktriangledown 10$. West will either win the $\blacktriangledown A$, making your $\blacktriangledown K$ good; or duck, in which case your $\blacktriangledown 10$ serves as your 9^{th} trick. As the card lie, you will actually take 11 tricks.
