East deals and passes. You have only 14 HP, but your distribution is sensational.



You open $1 \blacklozenge$ and your partner responds $1 \blacktriangledown$, naturally. You try a $1 \spadesuit$ and your partner rebids $2 \clubsuit$. This is the 4^{th} suit. It is forcing and may be artificial, saying nothing about clubs. If you can't find a fit in spades, you have no intention in playing in any suit but diamonds. You have a self sufficient trump suit and you show that by jumping to $3 \spadesuit$. Partner bids Blackwood and after showing your two aces, he carries you to $6 \spadesuit$.

West leads the ♥J and you see this imposing dummy.

In slam contract, it is usually best to count winners. You have 1 spade, 1 heart, 7 diamonds and 2 club tricks. That means you only need one more.

Did you notice that all the finesse involve leading up to the dummy? That means that if East was made to lead a suit from his hand. He would, in effect, be giving you a free finesse. This is what is called an "end play." Usually, end plays involve stripping your hands of one or more suits to force the opponent to lead the one containing the finesse, or else, giving you a ruff and discard. But, that is not the type of end play you have here. You don't care what suit is led, as long as East does the leading and he can't lead diamonds or trump.

Therefore, leave the ♥AQ in place and ruff the first trick. Pull trump in 3 rounds and now you're ready to throw East into the lead. But how?

The solution is rather elegant. Lead the $\spadesuit Q$ from your hand. If West has the $\spadesuit K$ and covers, win the $\spadesuit A$. Now all you need to do is force out the $\spadesuit J$ with your $\spadesuit 10$ and your $\spadesuit 9$ will be the needed extra trick.

If West plays low, you play low from the dummy. If West holds the \clubsuit K, your \clubsuit Q will win the trick. More likely though, East will win the \clubsuit K. Then he will be end played. If he leads a low spade, cover with the \spadesuit 10 and if West plays the \spadesuit J, you win the \clubsuit A in the dummy and your \spadesuit 9 is high. If East leads the \spadesuit J, win the \spadesuit A and your \spadesuit 10 takes the 12th trick. If he leads either a heart or club, you take your free finesse. This is a cold slam.
