## A • • • INVITING TO A MINOR SUIT SLAM • • •

Everyone is vulnerable and North is the dealer He opens  $1 \heartsuit$ . East overcalls  $1 \diamondsuit$  and it's your bid:



You are not strong enough to bid you minors at the 2-level, but you can make a Negative Double, implying length in the two minors. You need about 8 HCP for this double, and you have 10 HCP.

West jumps to 3. This is pre-emptive and is based on the Law of Total Tricks. It indicates West has 4 Spades and less than 10 HCP. Your partner rebids 4. What do you think this means?


This is a cue bid that occurs after the first round so it is a strong, forcing bid that indicates a desire to go to slam. Either he has a self-sufficient Heart suit or he has support for the one or both of the two suits you have indicated by your Negative Double. The cue bid at the 4-level also tends to indicate control of the Spade suit; either a void or the singleton A.

Even though you have shown both minors, you have a clear preference for Diamonds. You rebid should be  $5 \spadesuit$ . Partner raises you to  $6 \spadesuit$ , which becomes the final contract.

West led the ♠4. You see this dummy:



Lead: ♠4



In suit contracts, you usually count losers. But in slam contract, counting winners is more efficient and easier.

You have 5 Diamonds, 2 Clubs and 3 Hearts as top tricks. Your plan is to set up the Heart suit for extra winners. If the Hearts break 3-3, only a 36% probability, there will be 13 tricks available. Even with the more probable 4-2, you have plenty of trump and transportation to set up at least 2 extra winners on which to discard the two losing Clubs.

Because of the the fortunate Heart break and the fall of the ♠Q under the ♠AK, there is nothing to the play for 13 tricks.
