You are the dealer with this hand:
$S$ undefined

This is a $4 \times 1$, or a $4=4=4=1$. It has 14 HCP and the standard opening is $1 \star$. West overcalls and partner responds 4 .

This is a cuebid showing strong support of Diamonds. A cuebid at the 4 -level by your partner is game forcing and slam invitational. You can accept the invitation with a control cuebid of $4 \boldsymbol{1}$. This says you have a first or second round control of Spades, but not of Hearts. North wants to use Blackwood to check on key cards, and therefore doesn't have the luxury of checking on club stoppers. He just rebids 4NT.

You have 3 key cards and rebid 5 . . Now partner asks for Kings. Having none, you just return to a small slam of $6 \star$.

West leads the K and you see this dummy.

At first look, this doesn't seem like it makes. You have 3 or 4 Spades, 2 Hearts, 4 Diamonds and 1 Club. You are 1 or 2 tricks short.

Since West overcalled with a weak long club hand, the probability is high that the missing K is in East (good) and the Q is also in East (bad).

There is a winning line of play that is not always recognized. It is called "dummy reversal." Put yourself in the North position to play this deal. Assuming the K is on side, you have 10 top tricks and 2 Club ruffs, for a total of 12.

Win the A and don't draw any trump. First go to the dummy twice in Hearts and ruff the two Clubs, using the low Diamonds. Now you can draw the trump in three rounds, ending in the Dummy. Lead the $\$$ J and $\$ 10$. East does best by covering one of those honors. Now you can only take 3 Spades and must ruff the $4^{\text {th }}$ Spade with dummy's last Diamond. Finally, you must lose the Heart to the $\backsim$ Q which turns out to be in West. You've taken 3 Spades and 1 Spade ruff, 2 Hearts, 3 Diamonds, 1 Club and 2 Club ruffs. That's 12 tricks in total for +980 .
